

Adam Arenson: Home Savings Mid-Century Modern Banking Architecture

Adam Arenson is Associate Professor of history and director of the Urban Studies program at Manhattan College. He will discuss his latest book, Banking on Beauty: Millard Sheets and Midcentury Commercial Architecture in California (University of Texas Press) in a lecture titled "Millard Sheets & Home Savings: Mid-Century Modern Architecture for Corporate & Urban Identity".
